

UNIQUE IN MANY WAYS

Since its opening in 2006, the DDR Museum has become one of the most-visited museums in Berlin. A number of features make it unique:

A UNIQUE APPROACH

The DDR Museum is so much more than simply viewing objects behind glass. Visitors have to actively participate to experience the exhibition. They can touch objects, open drawers and closets. On their exhilarating journey back in time, they will find themselves discovering and feeling a range of different things in every corner of the museum. They land in the East German socialist past, where they get to know the realities of everyday life in a communist dictatorship. Experiencing history hands-on, our visitors are invited to question clichés and expand their knowledge about a bygone state.

A UNIQUE SOURCE OF FUNDING

As an entirely private company, the DDR Museum does not receive any state subsidies or other sources of funding. Financing its activities entirely by admission fees, this experiment has turned out to be successful. Maintaining the commercial viability of the museum, the management carefully reinvests profits into the museum's facilities and exhibitions. Due to an increasing number of visitors, we extended the permanent exhibition in 2010 whereby the DDR Museum was again nominated for the European Museum of the Year Award in 2012 (first nomination in 2008). In 2016, the third part of the permanent exhibition, an originally furnished WBS 70-prefabricated building apartment, opened to the public.

A UNIQUE FOCUS

The DDR Museum is the only institution of its kind to provide a holistic and interactive account of the conditions that prevailed in the East German dictatorship. From everyday life to political, military and economic structures, the museum conveys life in a dictatorship. Therefore, the exhibition shows history from the perspective of the population and focuses on the everyday consequences of the decisions made by the Socialist Unity Party of Germany (SED). From this perspective, »history from below« does not only show how people lived, shopped, ate and occupied themselves, but also how they were forced to negotiate a difficult path through the competing demands of loyalty to the state and the precepts of their own conscience. This cultural-historical approach is close to those who experienced this part of history and goes far beyond a mere presentation of historical facts.

A HANDS-ON EXPERIENCE OF HISTORY

The staging and concept of the permanent exhibition place particular emphasis on interactivity. Visitors are invited to learn about everyday life in the GDR and to expand their knowledge in an engaging way. The exhibition is not chronologically, but rather thematically divided into some 50 topics. In each of these thematic areas, visitors can discover exciting exhibits and interactive installations that tell stories about life in the GDR.

Visitors descend from the entrance floor to the first part of the exhibition and are greeted by a six-metre wide original Berlin Wall and wall diorama. Next to the Berlin Wall are the new thematic areas »German Division« and »GDR Compact« with numerous modules, new interactive elements and information.

Behind this section is our prefabricated housing estate on a scale of 1:20. Whilst this part of the exhibition appears grey, dreary and monotonous at first glance, upon closer inspection it showcases aspects of lively everyday culture in the GDR. The prefabricated buildings are both room dividers and showcase cabinets. Opening drawers and cabinets allows insight into the private lives of GDR citizens. As visitors enter the second part of the exhibition, they reach the »semicircle of power« and see that the Party was at the centre of everything. This centre is surrounded by a semicircle of different topics, such as »Politics«, »Military« and »Economy«. Visitors can open doors, hatches and drawers and, thus, gain a detailed look behind the façade of state power.

In the third and final part of the permanent exhibition, a completely furnished and authentic prefabricated flat shows aspects of private life in the GDR. A child's and teenager's room, a bedroom, a living room, a kitchen, a bathroom, a Stasi surveillance room as well as a garage can be freely explored and experienced.

Screens with descriptive texts introduce the respective thematic areas in six languages. Additional renovation work planned for the future will allow content to be communicated to visitors from all over the world in a simpler and more informative way than before.





















OUR COLLECTION

The collection of the museum currently comprises about 300,000 objects, which are inventoried in order to make them accessible to external researchers, other cultural institutions and for research purposes. Most of the objects come from private individuals who donated their »prized possessions« to the museum. Thousands of different donors have preserved objects for posterity in this way.

The collection of the DDR Museum is not open to the public. However, to give insights into the diverse collection, there is a monthly changing display of the object of the month in the foyer of the DDR Museum. The foyer can be visited free of charge.

The mural was created for the conference hall of the House of Statistics in the centre of Berlin. After the building was demolished in 2010, the DDR Museum purchased the mural from the Federal Agency for Real Estate and invested about € 20,000 into its restoration and new installation. In 2010, the painter himself unveiled the restored art piece—now a historical object—at its new place in the DDR Museum.

FUTURISTIC TECHNOLOGY

Our concept »hands-on experience of history« does not only refer to the exhibits which visitors are encouraged to touch, handle and enjoy, but also to the exhibition technology. We use state-of-the-art multimedia technology to guarantee the best possible museum experience: futuristic technology such as a digital mirror, an interactive table, transparent screens, various multi-touchscreen applications, motion sensors, digital windows, bone conduction speakers, 2D-animations and magnet-contacts all complement traditional elements such as dioramas, cabinets, games and objects. This combination of tradition and innovation creates a unique and refreshing museum experience.

TRABANT DRIVING SIMULATION

In cooperation with the Fraunhofer Heinrich-Hertz-Institut, the DDR Museum developed a highly-authentic simulator, reproducing the sights, sounds and functions (ignition, accelerator, brake, steering) of an original Trabant P 601. Visitors can drive around a realistic 3D reproduction of a Berlin housing estate projected onto the front windscreen.

EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

Not only focusing on a contemporary way to create an exhibition, the DDR Museum places great importance on the high-quality educational services, including guided tours of the exhibition, city tours and talks with contemporary witnesses. We offer tours and other services in twelve languages.

The conference room was set up for school groups wanting to prepare or talk about their visit to the exhibition. Up to 50 people have the opportunity to carry out research, seminars, lessons, discussions with contemporary witnesses or film screenings at the same time. A media library and a well-stocked specialised library are available on site.

1 The Berlin Wall 120 MIN

During a two-hour tour the group will explore the former death strip between West and East Berlin, located between Eberswalder Straße and Bernauer Straße.

2 Opposition in the GDR 120 MIN

This tour leads groups through Prenzlauer Berg and shows what kinds of opposition existed, for example those of artists, intellectuals, punks and members of the church. This resistance eventually led to the Peaceful Revolution in the 1980s.

3 Everyday life in the Capital of the GDR 120 MIN

This tour shows everyday life in the GDR capital and takes the group to authentic places, such as the Marienkirche, the TV tower, the Centrum Warenhaus on Alexanderplatz, the Red Town Hall, the Nikolaiviertel district and the former Palace of the Republic.

Berlin-Mitte 240 MIN

This four-hour tour through the centre of Berlin takes visitors to the boulevard Unter den Linden, the Brandenburg Gate, Checkpoint Charlie, the Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe and other locations significant to the history of Berlin in the twentieth century.

D TALKS AND WORKSHOPS

1 Talking with contemporary witnesses

Talks with contemporary witnesses of the GDR offer a first-hand account of everyday life in East Germany. Audiences can ask questions and gain a vivid appreciation of the special quality of life in East Germany. We provide witnesses who can speak about almost any aspect of life in the GDR including everyday life, school life, work, oppositional activities and imprisonment by the Stasi.



A companion to the permanent exhibition

The Wall and the Iron Curtain shielded the GDR from the Western world. Inside, the state security service or »Stasi« guarded over 16 million people on behalf of the Socialist Unity Party. But what was life like under socialism? Did it consist only of Spreewald gherkins, nudists and prefabricated tower block buildings? Was everyday life characterised by social security and full employment or by a shortage economy and queuing?

The DDR Guide is the book accompanying the permanent exhibition of the DDR Museum and at the same time the entertaining standard work on life in the GDR. Readers can expect 66 exciting chapters, written by the experts of the DDR Museum. Over 200 photos and graphics illustrate everyday life in the GDR in a vivid way and describe many of the exhibits of the permanent exhibition. GDR Daily Life in 200 Objects

Objects of everyday life and consumption had a higher value in GDR society than today. They were used for a long time and repaired more often-the GDR was a kind of »society of keepers«. In part, the material heritage of the SED state enjoys an almost cult-like veneration today. The objects presented here reveal a cross-section of 40 years of everyday life in the GDR. There is a story behind each of these everyday objects.

The sometimes-inconspicuous exhibits-from the K109 coffee machine to the refrigerator to the mantlepiece clock-provide an insight into the everyday life of the people of the vanished state. In this book, we bring the past into the present. Detailed photographs by Thorsten Heideck and Adrian Serini and texts written by historian and GDR expert Dr Stefan Wolle offer a broad spectrum of life in the GDR.

OUR **VISITORS**

The DDR Museum has set itself the aim of disseminating a lively interest in history amongst all sections of society. Our exhibition is designed to make history accessible to the wider public, regardless of their level of knowledge. All exhibition texts are written in German and English. Additional services are available in twelve languages.

Since the opening of the DDR Museum in 2006, the number of visitors has risen. This means that, since 2012, well over half a million Berliners as well as tourists from Germany and abroad have experienced »hands-on history« each year.

Due to the large number of interactive exhibition elements, the museum is suitable for every age group, even for primary school students. Target group-specific guided tours, games and workshops also introduce younger generations to German history.
